the 28 papers examine questions relating to the extent and nature of byzantine trade from late antiquity into the middle ages the byzantine state was the only political entity of the mediterranean to survive antiquity and thus offers a theoretical standard against which to measure diachronic and regional changes in trading practices within the area and beyond to complement previous extensive work on late antique long distance trade within the mediterranean based on the grain supply amphorae and fine ware circulation the papers concentrate on local and international trade the emphasis is on recently uncovered or studied archaeological evidence relating to key topics these include local retail organisation within the city some regional markets within the empire the production and or circulation patterns of particular goods metalware ivory and bone glass pottery and objects of international trade both exports such as wine and glass imports such as materia medica and the lack of importation of for example sasanian pottery in particular new work relating to

specific regions of byzantium s international trade is highlighted in britain the levant the red sea the black sea and china papers of the 38th spring symposium of byzantine studies held in 2004 at oxford under the auspices of the committee for byzantine studies

historians of british colonial rule in india have noted both the place of military might and the imposition of new cultural categories in the making of empire but bhavani raman in document raj uncovers a lesser known story of power the power of bureaucracy drawing on extensive archival research in the files of the east india company s administrative offices in madras she tells the story of a bureaucracy gone awry in a fever of documentation practices that grew ever more abstract and the power both economic and cultural this created in order to assert its legitimacy and value within the british empire the east india company was diligent about record keeping raman shows however that the sheer volume of their document production allowed colonial managers to subtly but substantively manipulate records for their own ends increasingly drawing the real and the recorded further apart while this administrative sleight of hand increased the company s reach and power within the empire it also bolstered profoundly new orientations to language writing memory and pedagogy for the officers and indian subordinates involved immersed in a subterranean world of delinquent scribes translators village accountants and entrepreneurial fixers document raj maps the shifting boundaries of the legible and illegible the legal and illegitimate that would usher india into the modern world

i am very much aware that it is an act of extreme rashness to attempt to write an elementary book about structures indeed it is only when the subject is stripped of its mathematics that one begins to realize how difficult it is to pin down and describe those structural concepts which are often called elementary by which i suppose we mean basic or fundamental some of the omissions and oversimplifications are intentional but no doubt some of them are due to my own brute ignorance and lack of understanding of the subject although this volume is more or less a sequel to the new science of strong

materials it can be read as an entirely separate book in its own right for this reason a certain amount of repetition has been unavoidable in the earlier chapters i have to thank a great many people for factual information suggestions and for stimulating and sometimes heated discussions among the living my colleagues at reading university have been generous with help notably professor w d biggs professor of building technology dr richard chaplin dr giorgio jeronimidis dr julian vincent and dr henry blyth professor anthony flew professor of philosophy made useful suggestions about the last chapter i am also grateful to mr john bartlett consultant neurosurgeon at the brook hospital professor t p hughes of the university of the west indies has been helpful about rockets and many other things besides my secretary mrs jean collins was a great help in times of trouble mrs nethercot of vogue was kind to me about dressmaking mr gerald leach and also many of the editorial staff of penguins have exercised their accustomed patience and helpfulness among the dead i owe a great deal to dr mark pryor lately of trinity college cambridge especially for discussions about biomechanics which extended over a period of nearly thirty years lastly for reasons which must surely be obvious i owe a humble oblation to herodotus once a citizen of halicamassus

architecture for the poor describes hassan fathy s plan for building the village of new gurna near luxor egypt without the use of more modern and expensive materials such as steel and concrete using mud bricks the native technique that fathy learned in nubia and such traditional egyptian architectural designs as enclosed courtyards and vaulted roofing fathy worked with the villagers to tailor his designs to their needs he taught them how to work with the bricks supervised the erection of the buildings and encouraged the revival of such ancient crafts as claustra lattice designs in the mudwork to adorn the buildings

this publication traces the history and restoration of chandi borobudur a buddhist temple built over 1 000 years ago on the island of java indonesia which was successfully restored during 1973 1983 and listed as a world heritage site in 1991 it covers the various aspects of the process including the long and painstaking task of logging the position of the stones the studies that revealed the underlying sources of decay and the important archaeological finds that provided clues to the temple s spiritual past and includes many of the original drawings and photographs taken from the restoration project archives

scientist mathematician and art historian in addition to seven essays by florensky the book includes a biographical introduction and an examination of florensky s contribution as an art historian by nicoletta misler beyond vision reveals florensky s fundamental attitudes to the vital questions of construction composition chronology function and destination in the fields of painting sculpture and design his reputation as a theologian and philosopher is already established in the english speaking world but this first collection in english of his art essays translated by wendy salmond will be a revelation to those in the field pavel florensky was a true polymath trained in mathematics and philosophy at moscow university he rejected a scholarship in advanced mathematics in order to study theology at the moscow theological academy he was also an expert linguist scientist and art historian a victim of the soviet government s animosity towards religion he was condemned to a siberian labor camp in 1933 where he continued his work under increasingly difficult circumstances he was executed in 1937
