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a stimulating elegant yet pugnacious essay observer in this highly acclaimed seminal work edward said surveys the history and nature of western attitudes towards the east considering orientalism as a powerful european ideological creation a way for writers philosophers and colonial administrators to deal with the otherness of eastern culture customs and beliefs he traces this view through the writings of homer nerval and flaubert disraeli and kipling whose imaginative depictions have greatly contributed to the west s romantic and exotic picture of the orient in the afterword said examines the effect of continuing western imperialism

edward said is perhaps best known as the author of the landmark study orientalism a book which changed the face of critical theory and shaped the emerging field of post colonial studies and for his controversial journalism on the palestinian political situation looking at the context and the impact of said s scholarship and journalism this book examines said s key ideas including the significance of worldliness amateurism secular criticism affiliation and contrapuntal reading the place of text and critic in the world knowledge power and the construction of the other links between culture and imperialism exile identity and the plight of palestine a new chapter looking at said s later work and style this popular guide has been fully updated and revised in a new edition suitable for readers approaching said s work for the first time as well as those already familiar with the work of this important theorist the result is the ideal guide to one of the twentieth century s most engaging critical thinkers

since edward said s foundational work orientalism has been singled out for critique as the quintessential example of western intellectuals collaboration with oppression controversies over the imbrications of knowledge and power and the complicity of orientalism in the larger project of colonialism have been waged among generations of scholars but has orientalism come to stand in for all of the sins of european modernity at the cost of neglecting the complicity of the rest of the academic disciplines in this landmark theoretical investigation wael b hallaq reevaluates and deepens the critique of orientalism in order to deploy it for rethinking the foundations of the modern project refusing to isolate or scapegoat orientalism restating orientalism extends the critique to other fields from law philosophy and scientific inquiry to core ideas of academic thought such as sovereignty and the self hallaq traces their involvement in colonialism mass annihilation and systematic destruction of the natural world interrogating and historicizing the set of causes that permitted modernity to wed knowledge to power restating orientalism offers a bold rethinking of the theory of the author the concept of sovereignty and the place of the secular western self in the modern project reopening the problem of power and knowledge to an ethical critique and ultimately theorizing an exit from modernity s predicaments a remarkably ambitious attempt to overturn the foundations of a wide range of academic disciplines while also drawing on the best they have to offer restating orientalism exposes the depth of academia s lethal complicity in modern forms of capitalism colonialism and hegemonic power

edward said s orientalism is a masterclass in the art of interpretation wedded to close analysis interpretation is characterized by close attention to the meanings of terms by clarifying questioning definitions and positing clear definitions combined with one of the main sub skills of analysis drawing inferences and finding implicit reasons and assumptions in arguments interpretation becomes a powerful tool for critical thought in orientalism the theorist critic and cultural historian edward said uses interpretation and analysis to closely examine western representations of the orient and ask what they are really doing and why one of his central arguments is that western representations of the east and middle east persistently define it as other setting it up in opposition to the west through careful analysis of a range of texts and other materials said shows that implicit assumptions about the orient s otherness underlie much western thought and writing about it clarifying consistently the differences between the real world east and the constructed ideas of the orient said s interpretative skills power his analysis and provide the basis for an argument that has proven hugely influential in literary criticism philosophy and even politics

the late edward said remains one of the most influential critics and public intellectuals of our time with lasting contributions to many disciplines much of his reputation derives from the phenomenal multidisciplinary influence of his 1978 book orientalism said s seminal polemic analyzes novels travelogues and academic texts to argue that a dominant discourse of west over east has warped virtually all past european and american representation of the near east but despite the book s wide acclaim no systematic critical survey of the rhetoric in said s representation of orientalism and the resulting impact on intellectual culture has appeared until today drawing on the extensive discussion of said s work in more than 600 bibliographic entries daniel martin varisco has written an ambitious intellectual history of the debates that said s work has sparked in several disciplines highlighting in particular its reception among arab and european scholars while pointing out said s tendency to essentialize and privilege certain texts at the expense of those that do not comfortably it his theoretical framework varisco analyzes the extensive commentary the book has engendered in oriental studies literary and cultural studies feminist scholarship history political science and anthropology he employs critical satire to parody the exaggerated and pedantic aspects of post colonial discourse including said s profound underappreciation of the role of irony and reform in many of the texts he cites the end result is a companion volume to orientalism and the vast research it inspired rather than contribute to dueling essentialisms varisco provides a path to move beyond the binary of east versus west and the polemics of blame reading orientalism is the most comprehensive survey of said s writing and thinking to date it will be of strong interest to scholars of middle east studies anthropology history cultural studies post colonial studies and literary studies

the debate on orientalism began some fifty years ago in the wake of decolonization while initially considered a turning point edward said s orientalism 1978 was in fact part of a larger academic endeavor the political critique of colonial science that had already significantly impacted the humanities and social sciences in a recent attempt to broaden the debate the papers collected in this volume offered at various seminars and an international symposium held in paris in 2010 2011 critically examine whether orientalism as knowledge and as creative expression was in fact fundamentally subservient to western domination by raising new issues the papers shift the focus from the center to the peripheries thus analyzing the impact on local societies of a major intellectual and institutional movement that necessarily changed not only their world but the ways in which they represented their world world history which assumes a plurality of perspectives leads us to observe that the saidian critique applies to powers other than western european ones three case studies are considered here the ottoman russian and soviet and chinese empires other essays in this volume proceed to analyze how post independence states have made use of the tremendous accumulation of knowledge and representations inherited from previous colonial regimes for the sake of national identity as well as how scholars change and adapt what was once a hegemonic discourse for their own purposes what emerges is a new landscape in which to situate research on non western cultures and societies and a road map leading readers beyond the restrictive dichotomy of a confrontation between west and east with contributions by elisabeth allès léon buskens stéphane a dudoignon baudouin dupret edhem eldem olivier herrenschmidt nicholas s hopkins robert irwin mouldi lahmar sylvette larzul jean gabriel leturcq jessica marglin claire nicholas emmanuelle perrin alain de pommereau françois pouillon zakaria rhani emmanuel szurek jean claude vatin mercedes volait

a series of dazzling case studies exploring the idea of lateness in a range of composers writers and artists london review of books gracefully unquiet probing and wise said s own elegiac masterpiece of late style financial times what said stands for critical intelligence high art and the preservation of the language must be at the centre of our lives this book is a fine monument to his life and work hanif kureishi his own late style if it is acceptable to call it that mixes an easy mastery of material with an unquenched desire to preserve difficulties guardian on late style examines the work produced by great artists beethoven thomas mann jean genet among them at the end of their lives said makes it clear that rather than the resolution of a lifetime s artistic endeavour most of the late works discussed are rife with contradiction and almost impenetrable complexity he helps us see how though these works often stood in direct contrast to the tastes of society they were just as often announcements of what was to come in the artist s discipline works of true artistic genius

diva distinguished panel of contributors assess and expand edward said s many contributions to the study of colonialism imperialism and representation that have marked his career long struggle to end conflict and further the effort to build civilizati div

edward said is one of the foremost thinkers writing today his work as a literary and cultural critic a political commentator and the champion of the cause of palestinian rights has given him a unique position in western intellectual life this new book is a major exploration and assessment of his writings in all these main areas focusing on said s insistence on the connection between literature politics and culture kennedy offers an overview and assessment of the main strands of said s work drawing out the links and contradictions between each area the book begins with an examination of orientalism one of the founding texts of post colonial studies kennedy looks at the book in detail probing both its strengths and weaknesses and linking it to its sequel culture and imperialism she then examines said s work on the palestinian people with his emphasis on the need for a palestinian narrative to counter pro israeli accounts of the middle east and his searing criticisms of us israeli and even arab governments the book closes with an examination of said s importance in the field of post colonial studies notably colonial discourse analysis and post colonial theory and his significance as a public intellectual this book will be of great interest to anyone studying post colonialism literary theory politics and the middle east as well as anyone interested in said s writings

using the work of edward said as a point of departure this book dissects the concept of orientalism through the lens of 19th century missionary impressions of kurdistan wilcox argues that dominant interpretations of said s work have a tendency to present orientalism as an essentialist practice and instead offers an alternative manifestation in which the oriental is perceived as the mutable product of cultural forces the relationship between missionaries and imperialism has long been a contentious issue with many scholars highlighting their apparent ambiguity this study reveals how protestant missionaries can be identified as anti imperialist in their rhetoric of ecumenical independence yet through their preconceptions of oriental inferiority they contributed to a more subtle undermining of local forms of knowledge and identity wilcox argues that this apparent ambiguity is in part a consequence of the ways in which the term imperialism is frequently used to allude to diverse and even contradictory meanings therefore it is not so much the missionaries who are ambiguous as the ways in which they are judged by today s multivalent standards the analysis also makes clear the complex discursive processes which can undermine the actions of altruistic individuals by drawing threads from this 19th century example into the current geopolitical foreground of middle east west relations this book not only sheds light upon a little known historical case study but also illuminates larger questions of the present and future encouraging a more vigorous examination of contemporary orientalist prejudices

since john esposito published his first book nearly 40 years ago he has been guiding readers beyond misleading and dangerous stereotypes of muslims the essays in this volume highlights the contributions of scholars from a variety of disciplines who like esposito present islam as a multi faceted and dynamic tradition embraced by communities in globally interconnected but substantially diverse contexts over the centuries

this second edition considers how the global war on terror has changed the way the west views the islamic world

edward said was an exiled individual the out of place palestinian in the usa he saw the consequences of the 1948 dismantling of palestine and the establishment of israel through his parents experiences and through the collective statelessness imposed on the palestinians his own personal experience of exile intensified when he moved to the usa yet despite the significance of exile to said s lifeand work no scholarship has yet focused on this theme in his writings or traced its ongoing applicability and importance rehnuma sazzad fulfils this pressing need in literary and cultural research by providing the first comprehensive definition of said s theory of exile and reveals its legacy in relation to five middle eastern intellectuals naguib mahfouz mahmoud darwish leila ahmed nawal el saadawi and youssef chahine by selecting a novelist poet feminist filmmaker and essayist sazzad shows how for said the ideal intellectual is a metaphorical exile demonstrating a willing homelessness this book creates a portrait of redoubtable intellectual practice and in the twenty first century context when the frontiers of belonging are being constantly redrawn edward said s concept of exile adds new depths to discourses of resistance home and identity

revolving around the theme of counterpoint extensively used by edward said as the interplay of diverse ideas and discrepant experiences this book aims to explore said s contribution to the fields of comparative literature literary criticism postcolonial theory exilic and transnational studies and socio political thought among many others overshadowed by his legitimate political positions in support to the palestinian cause and at odds with islamophobic hostilities said s intellectual achievements in the fields of humanities and philosophical thinking should equally be acknowledged and celebrated said articulates his notion of counterpoints through a vivid description of the composition of western classical music in the counterpoint of western classical music various themes play off one another with only a provisional privilege being given to any particular one yet in the resulting polyphony there is concert and order an organized interplay that derives from the themes not from a rigorous melodic or formal principle outside the work this book pays tribute to said s contrapuntal methodology as well as to his academic and humanistic legacy

edward said and the question of subjectivity explores the notion of subjectivity implicated in and articulated by said in his writings analyzing several of his major works pannian argues that there is a shift in said s intellectual trajectory that takes place after the composition of orientalism in so doing said forthrightly attempts to retrieve a theoretical and political humanism as pannian identifies despite the difficult and sanguinary aspects of its past he elaborates upon said s understanding that only after recognising the structures of violence and coming to discern strategies of interpellation may the individual subject effectively resist them pannian also explores said s ideas on exilic subjectivity the role of intellectuals acts of memory critical secularism affiliation and solidarity before dwelling on his interface with marxist thinkers such as antonio gramsci theodor adorno and raymond williams this engagement marks said s own subject formation and shapes his self reflexive mode of knowledge production

the experience of colonization and the challenges of a post colonial world have produced an explosion of new writing in english this diverse and powerful body of literature has established a specific practice of post colonial writing in cultures as various as india australia the west indies and canada and has challenged both the traditional canon and dominant ideas of literature and culture the empire writes back was the first major theoretical account of a wide range of post colonial texts and their relation to the larger issues of post colonial culture and remains one of the most significant works published in this field the authors three leading figures in post colonial studies open up debates about the interrelationships of post colonial text and show how these texts constitute a radical critique of eurocentric notions of literature and language this book is brilliant not only for its incisive analysis but for its accessibility for readers new to the field now with an additional chapter and an updated bibliography the empire writes back is essential for contemporary post colonial studies

exiles in the city hannah arendt and edward w said in counterpoint by william v spanos explores the affiliative relationship between arendt s and said s thought not simply their mutual emphasis on the importance of the exilic consciousness in an age characterized by the decline of the nation state and the rise of globalization but also on the oppositional politics that a displaced consciousness enables the pairing of these two extraordinary intellectuals is unusual and controversial because of their ethnic identities in radically secularizing their comportment towards being their exilic condition enabled them to undertake inaugural critiques of the culture of the nation state system of western modernity as variations on the theme of exile the five chapters of this book constitute reflections on what is foundational and abiding in both arendt s and said s work they not only document the heretofore unnoticed affiliation between the two thinkers they also shed light on arendt s and said s proleptic activist explorations of the urgent question of palestine especially on the fraught present situation which bears increasing witness to the irony that the israeli nation state s solution has from the beginning systematically repeated the degradations the jewish people suffered at the hands of german nationalism

edward w said locates joseph conrad s fear of personal disintegration in his constant re narration of the past using the author s personal letters as a guide to understanding his fiction said draws an important parallel between conrad s view of his own life and the manner and form of his stories the critic also argues that the author who set his fiction in exotic locations like east asia and africa projects political dimensions in his work that mirror a colonialist preoccupation with civilizing native peoples said then suggests that this dimension should be considered when reading all of western literature first published in 1966 said s critique of the western self s struggle with modernity signaled the beginnings of his groundbreaking work orientalism and remains a cornerstone of postcolonial studies today

by the time of his death in 2003 edward said was one of the most famous literary critics of the twentieth century said s work has been hugely influential far beyond academia as a prominent advocate for the palestinian cause and noted cultural critic said redefined the role of the public intellectual this volume explores the problems and opportunities afforded by said s work its productive and generative capacities as well as its in built limitations after said captures the essence of said s intellectual and political contribution and his extensive impact on postcolonial studies it examines his legacy by critically elaborating his core concepts and arguments among the issues it tackles are humanism orientalism culture and imperialism exile and the contrapuntal realism and postcolonial modernism world literature islamophobia and capitalism and the political economy of empire it is an excellent resource for students graduates and instructors studying postcolonial literary theory and the works of said

new translation of the metamorphosis by franz kafka poor gregor samsa this guy wakes up one morning to discover that he s become a monstrous vermin the first pages of the metamorphosis where gregor tries to communicate through the bedroom door with his family who think he s merely being lazy is vintage screwball comedy indeed scholars and readers alike have delighted in kafka s gallows humor and matter of fact handling of the absurd and the terrifying but it is one of the most enigmatic stories of all time with an opening sentence that s unparalleled in all of literature

excavations at the etruscan site of poggio civitate murlo have produced some of the most spectacular and provocative material recovered from etruria this volume presents the reconstruction and study of a large assemblage of bucchero pottery recovered from the lower building at poggio civitate in deposits dating from the late orientalizing period bucchero is a characteristic etruscan ceramic type that is commonly found at orientalizing and archaic period etruscan sites this study represents the first major publication on bucchero from poggio civitate and also is one of the few studies of a large assemblage of bucchero recovered from a nonfunerary context the author examines the chronology style and function of the bucchero and also considers the question of its place of production the analysis of the bucchero from the lower building has important implications not only for the dating of the rest of the orientalizing period ceramic assemblage at poggio civitate but also for the dating and study of bucchero in etruria as a whole

the end of the peace process is a new edition of edward said s passionate critique of the oslo accord and its aftermath updated to include around twenty new essays about the events of 2000 1 said brilliantly analyses the deficiencies of oslo and the reasons why the subsequent middle east peace process failed so disastrously his criticism of the accord has proved acutely prescient but he retains hope writing in an impassioned new introduction about the growing non violent secular palestinian movements and calling for those on the israeli european and american left to support it
