Almost all snails possess a radula, making it a defining characteristic of the Gastropoda class. Exceptions are extremely rare. 4. Can the structure of a snail's radula be used for species identification? Yes, the shape and arrangement of denticles on the radula are important characteristics used by taxonomists in the classification and identification of snail species. 5. What would happen if a snail lost all its denticles? The snail would be unable to feed effectively and would likely starve to death. While some regeneration is possible, total loss of denticles would be fatal.

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
