during the late nineteenth century the city of berlin developed such a reputation for lawlessness and sexual licentiousness that it came to be known as the whore of babylon out of this reputation for debauchery grew an unusually rich discourse around prostitution in berlin coquette jill suzanne smith shows how this discourse transcended the usual clichés about prostitutes and actually explored complex visions of alternative moralities or sexual countercultures including the new morality articulated by feminist radicals lesbian love and the new woman combining extensive archival research with close readings of a broad spectrum of texts and images from the late wilhelmine and weimar periods smith recovers a surprising array of productive discussions about extramarital sexuality women s financial autonomy and respectability she highlights in particular the figure of the cocotte kokotte a specific type of prostitute who capitalized on the illusion of respectable or upstanding womanhood and therefore confounded easy categorization by exploring the semantic connections between the figure of the cocotte and the act of flirtation of being coquette smith s work presents flirtation as a type of social interaction through which both prostitutes and non prostitutes in imperial and weimar berlin could express extramarital sexual desire and agency

before 1660 english readers and theatergoers had never heard of a coquette by the early 1700s they could hardly watch a play read a poem or peruse a newspaper without encountering one why does british literature of this period pay so much attention to vain and flirtatious young women our coquettes examines the ubiquity of the coquette in the eighteenth century to show how this figure enables authors to comment upon a series of significant social and economic developments including the growth of consumer culture widespread new wealth increased travel and global trade and changes in the perception and practice of marriage the book surveys stage comedies periodical essays satirical poems popular songs and didactic novels to show that the early coquette is a figure of capacious desire she finds pleasure in a wide range of choices refusing to narrow any field of possibilities admirers luxury goods friends pets public gatherings down to a single option whereas scholars of the period have generally read the coquette as a simple and self evident type our coquettes emphasizes what is strange and surprising about this figure revealing the coquette to be a touchstone in developing discourses about sexuality consumerism empire and modernity itself winner of the walker cowen memorial prize for an outstanding work of scholarship in eighteenth

century studies

hannah webster foster based the coquette on the true story of elizabeth whitman an unmarried woman who died in childbirth in new england fictionalizing whitman s experiences in her heroine eliza wharton foster created a compelling narrative of seduction that was hugely successful with readers the boarding school a less widely known work by foster is an experimental text part epistolary novel and part conduct book together the novels explore the realities of women s lives in early america the critical introduction and appendices to this edition which explore female friendship and the education of women in the novels frame foster as more than a purveyor of the sentimental novel and re evaluate her placement in american literary history

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the power of sympathy 1789 is a novel by american author william hill brown considered the first american novel the power of sympathy is a work of sentimental fiction which explores the lessons of the enlightenment on the virtues of rational thought a story of forbidden romance seduction and incest brown s novel is based on the real life scandal of perez morton and fanny apthorp a new england brother and sister in law who struck up an affair that ended in suicide and infamy inspired by their tragedy and hoping to write a novel which captured the need for rational education in the newly formed united states of america brown wrote and published the power of sympathy anonymously in boston the novel narrated in a series of letters is the story of thomas harrington he falls for the local beauty harriot fawcett initially hoping to make her his mistress but when she rejects him his friend jack worthy suggests that he attempt to court and then propose to her which is the honorable and lawful choice thomas overly sentimental mind is persuaded by jack s unflinching reason and so he decides to pursue harriot once more this time he is successful and the two eventually become engaged but their happiness soon fades when mrs eliza holmes a family friend of the harringtons reveals the true nature of harriot s identity as the secrets of mr harrington thomas father are revealed the couple are forced to choose between the morals and laws of society and the passionate love they share the power of sympathy is a moving work of tragedy and romance with a pointed message about the need for education in the recently founded united states despite borrowing from the british and european traditions of sentimental fiction and the epistolary novel brown s work is a distinctly american masterpiece worthy of our continued respect and attention with a beautifully designed cover and professionally typeset manuscript this edition of william hill brown s the power of sympathy is a classic of american literature reimagined for modern readers

in mere equals lucia mcMahon narrates a story about how a generation of young women who enjoyed access to new educational opportunities made sense of their individual and social identities in an american nation marked by stark political inequality between the sexes mcMahon s archival research into the private documents of middling and well to do americans in northern states illuminates educated women s experiences with particular life stages and relationship arcs friendship family courtship marriage and motherhood in their personal and social relationships educated women attempted to live as the mere equals of men their often frustrated efforts reveal how early national americans grappled with the competing issues of women s intellectual equality and sexual difference in the new nation a pioneering society pushing westward and unmooring itself from established institutions often enlisted women s labor outside the home and in areas that we would deem public yet as a matter of law women lacked most rights of citizenship and this subordination was authorized by an ideology of sexual difference what women and men said about education how they valued it and how they used it to place themselves and others within social hierarchies is a highly useful way to understand the ongoing negotiation between equality and difference in public documents difference overwhelmed equality because the formal exclusion of women from political activity and from economic parity required justification mcMahon tracks the ways in which this public disparity took hold in private communications by the 1830s separate and gendered spheres were firmly in place this was the social and political heritage with which women s rights activists would contend for the rest of the century

in 1798 english essayist and novelist william godwin ignited a transatlantic scandal with memoirs of the author of a vindication of the rights of woman most controversial were the details of the romantic liaisons of godwin s wife mary wollstonecraft with both american gilbert imlay and godwin himself wollstonecraft s life and writings became central to a continuing discussion about love s place in human society literary radicals argued that the cultivation of intense friendship could lead to the renovation of social and political institutions whereas others maintained that these freethinkers were indulging their own desires with a disregard for stability and higher authority through correspondence and novels andrew cayton finds an ideal lens to view authors characters and readers all debating love s power to alter men and women in the world around them cayton argues for wollstonecraft s and godwin s enduring influence on fiction published in great britain and the united states and explores mary godwin shelley s endeavors to sustain her mother s faith in romantic love as an engine of social change

sentimentalism is usually studied through us british relations after the american revolution or in connection to national reforms like the abolitionist movement transamerican sentimentalism and nineteenth century us literary history instead argues that african american native american latinx and anglo american women writers also used sentimentalism to construct narratives that reframed or countered the violence dominating the nineteenth century americas including the haitian

revolution indian removal the us mexican war and cuba s independence wars by tracking the transformation of sentimentalism as the us reacted to enacted and intervened in conflict transamerican sentimentalism and nineteenth century us literary history demonstrates how marginalized writers negotiated hemispheric encounters amidst the gendered racialized and cultural violence of the nineteenth century americas it remaps sentiment s familiar transatlantic and national scholarly frameworks through authors such as leonora sansay and mary peabody mann and considers how authors including john rollin ridge john s and harriet jacobs maría amparo ruiz de burton victor séjour and martin r delany adapted the mode transamerican sentimentalism cannot unseat the violence of the nineteenth century americas but it does produce other potential outcomes including new paradigms for understanding the coquette a locally successful informal diplomacy and motivations for violent slave revolt such transformations mark not sentiment s failures or distortions but its adaptive attempts to survive and thrive

revolution and the word offers a unique perspective on the origins of american fiction looking not only at the early novels themselves but at the people who produced them sold them and read them it shows how in the aftermath of the american revolution the novel found a special place among the least privileged citizens of the new republic as cathy n davidson explains early american novels most of them now long forgotten were a primary means by which those who bought and read them especially women and the lower classes moved into the higher levels of literacy required by a democracy this very fact davidson shows also made these people less amenable to the control of the gentry who naturally enough derided fiction as a potentially subversive genre combining

rigorous historical methods with the newest insights of literacy theory davidson brilliantly reconstructs the complex interplay of politics ideology economics and other social forces that governed the way novels were written published distributed and understood davidson also shows in almost tactile detail how many americans lived during the constitutional era she depicts the life of the traveling book peddler the harsh lot of the printer the shortcomings of early american schools the ambiguous politics of novelists like brackenridge and tyler and the lost lives of ordinary women like tabitha tenney and patty rogers drawing on a vast body of material the novels themselves as well as reviews inscriptions in cherished books letters and diaries and many other records davidson presents the genesis of american literature in its fullest possible context

this book is a study of depictions of health and sickness in the early american novel 1787 1808 these texts reveal a troubling tension between the impulse toward social affection that built cohesion in the nation and the pursuit of self interest that was considered central to the emerging liberalism of the new republic good health is depicted as an extremely positive social value almost an a priori condition of membership in the community characters who have the glow of health tend to enjoy wealth and prestige those who become sick are burdened by poverty and debt or have made bad decisions that have jeopardized their status bodies that waste away faint or literally disappear off of the pages of america s first fiction are resisting the conditions that ail them as they plead for their right to exist they draw attention to the injustice apathy and greed that afflict them
